#### Pentecost Reflection and Class

Pentecost Sunday, the Holy Spirit was palpably present in ways expected and unexpected. In accomplishing God's singular will that day, the Holy Spirit did it in such a way to sanctify and heal each one of us according to our own particular needs: one he guided, one he consoled, one he humbled, and one he exalted. The Word of God-which we hear in scripture, the church's tradition and liturgy, and through one another as the Body of Christ-is likened to a "two-edged sword" (Hebrews 4:12), meaning that one edge may strike a person upon the head while the other edge may strike a person upon the chest. But, it is the still the same sword (or Word) that strikes! Thus, from on high, the Holy Spirit accomplishes God's single and unified will through many and various ways as he descends into human affairs. As a comical example of this, during Pentecost Sunday Mass I had made a liturgical mistake of setting the lectionary to the wrong option for the reading, and I realized this mistake had the potential to undermine Bishop Baker's homily. In the moment, I experienced great worry and self-inflicted humiliation for possibly having impaired Bishop's preaching. This experience humbled me interiorly, and after realizing my failure, I entrusted my mistake to the Lord Jesus and asked that He bring some good out of it somehow—and He did, for "we know that all things work for good for those who love God" (Romans 8:28). Later that day, after Mass had finished, I found out that my mistake had actually benefitted Bishop's homily, rather than wreck it. In bringing about the Divine will, the Holy Spirit permitted my mistake to humble me interiorly and to increase my trust and love of our Lord Jesus, and to aid Bishop's preaching. If we give all our gifts, talents, successes, failures and mistakes-the 'water' of our lives—the Holy Spirit will change them into wine!
